

East Brunswick Magnet School Spanish 3 CP Syllabus Sra. McKay Room: AC142

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2024-2025

Welcome/Bienvenidos! This course has been designed to give students the necessary tools to not only communicate in Spanish but to understand cultural aspects of the Spanish-speaking world. Students will develop intermediate-low proficiency in the four modes of language learning: speaking, listening, writing and reading. Students will be able to communicate using simple sentences to ask and answer questions, to handle simple transactions related to everyday life and to talk about subject matter studied in other classes.

Materiales:

- Cell phones are **NOT** permitted to be out during class unless approved by the teacher.

Descripción del curso:

Spanish 3 is an intermediate-level course that builds on prior knowledge and assesses the performance of (1) more advanced Spanish grammar structures, reinforced through the **four skill areas**: listening (intermediate low level), speaking (intermediate low level), reading (intermediate low level), and writing (intermediate low level), and (2) the three modes of

communication (interpretive, interpersonal, presentational). This course places emphasis on constructing and responding to complex questions, using a variety of vocabulary and expressions for initiating, maintaining, and concluding conversations, discussing both familiar and new topics, and enhancing fluency and pronunciation accuracy.

Intercultural communication is another key component of this course. Students are expected to investigate and interact through and with the Spanish language, so that they come up with and/or understand products, practices and behaviors characteristic of Spanish-speakers from a variety of countries, thus increasing their language and cultural awareness.

This course requires students' **commitment** to and **enthusiasm** for the Spanish language, looking to its legacy, importance, and usefulness in the United States and the global community.

Objetivos:

- 1. Use the language to engage in **interpersonal communication**. (memorized words, phrases, questions, and answers)
- 2. Understand **words and concepts** presented in the language. (true cognates/friends, literal translations, similar syntax, familiar topics, language components [stems, prefixes, tones, verb endings, parts of speech], key concepts from different content areas)
 - 3. Use the language to **present information** to an audience. (memorized items, appropriate pronunciation, reports, use of technology, roles and traditions in the target culture)
 - 4. Compare the **students' culture** and the **target culture** (behaviors, cultural expectations, loan words, tangible culturally related objects) while enhancing awareness of and appreciation for the linguistic and cultural diversity of the Spanish-speaking countries.

*Make sure to check <u>Google Classroom/Genesis</u> <u>every day</u> for any <u>missed work, updates, and messages</u>.

CLASSWORK. All the work assigned in class must be turned in on time at the end of class, unless otherwise specified by the teacher, in order to receive full credit. Late classwork will receive partial credit of 10% off per day late. After three days, late classwork will not be accepted, and a grade of zero will be given.

PARTICIPATION/CLASS COMMITMENT: You are expected to come to class on-time, prepared with your materials for class, the previous material learned, ready to participate,

ready to study, be responsible for your work, and show mutual respect to your classmates and teacher.

HOMEWORK: Students will be given an assortment of Homework assignments that develop and then measure mastery. Homework is an essential part of learning, as it allows you to practice and reinforce the material covered in class. Completing homework assignments regularly is crucial for understanding the content, participating in class discussions, and keeping up with classwork. If you do not complete your homework, you may fall behind on key concepts. If homework is submitted late, there will be a penalty of 10% off per day late. After three days, late homework will not be accepted, and a grade of zero will be given. Staying on top of homework is important to your success in this course. There will be a minimum of 5 homework assignments per MP.

QUIZZES: There will be a quiz after the completion of topics to check for understanding and may be bi-weekly. There will be a minimum of 4 quizzes per quarter and will add up to 20% of your final grade.

NOTEBOOK/BINDER: Students are required to maintain an organized Notebook/Binder for this class, which will be checked quarterly. Depending on quality and adherence to the teacher's criteria, students will earn either a quiz grade or a homework grade. Hard work will be rewarded.

TESTS/PROJECTS (AND PRESENTATIONS): There will be at least 1 test given near the end of each MP to check for mastery. There will be paper-based benchmarks in the middle and end of the school year. There may be at least 1 project assigned per MP that has to be done according to the criteria specified in a rubric. The rubric will be shared in class to ensure the expectations are clear. Any projects not in alignment with the rubric will be scored accordingly. Tests and projects will count towards 30% of the final grade.

*For all Assignments

- Expect to receive verbal and written assignments regularly.
- Verbal use of the Spanish language is mandatory as this is part of learning a language and will be required throughout many class assignments.
- SOME late classwork, in other words, work not submitted by the designated date and time, will be accepted but a deduction of points will be at the discretion of the teacher (based on factors such as the release of answers, quality of work, etc.).
- Students are required to complete missed work due to absences from school. As per
 District Policy, students will have 2 days for each day absent to make up work. In this
 regard, all students must communicate with the teacher in order to make up for
 missed work, in a way to keep communication a two-way street.

- You are expected to participate and put forth effort in class.
- It is the responsibility of the **student** to get the notes and/or assignment and make up any missed work during an absence.
- *Assignments are to be <u>completed by the student</u>. Specific assignments where it is evident that a student has copied from classmates, plagiarized, or cheated (on quizzes or tests) will lead to a zero on the assignment as well as a referral to school administration. Acceptable use of online translators for some classwork will be modeled in class and must be in accordance with the class contents. This means that mistranslations, computer based translations, plagiarism, incorrect vocabulary, inaccurate verb tense/grammar, misspellings, among others, will affect the assignment grade.
- If a student fails to complete an assignment and there has been no communication, the student will receive a temporary failing grade (zero, NOT meant to discourage you), which must be taken as a reminder of the pending assignment. If the work is not eventually submitted, then the failing grade (zero) will be permanent.

Classroom Procedures / Expectations:

- 5. Be present-- participate and ask questions.
- Electronic devices -You may NOT have your cell phone out unless permission was granted in advance or it's being used for an instructional purpose. (Use of cell-phones without permission will result in detention)
- 7. Passes are required before leaving the classroom.
