Magnet Schools Students Embark towards new Milestones, Continuing their Journeys

As the end of the school year has arrived, and before we swap our books for summer hobbies. let us take a moment to review a few milestones our school district has reached this year.

We started the second portion of our school year with the announcement that the Middlesex County Magnet Schools had been recognized by the State Department of Education with its prestigious Lighthouse Award for advancing educational equity. Commissioner Director Ronald G. Rios commended the district "for investing in the community by attracting students that are reflective of our culturally rich population and offering every resident free access to top quality, competitive education."



As a district, we are able to say that we rank among the best in the state, placing 2nd and 3rd out of the best public high schools in New Jersey according to the U.S. News & World Report. And, the New Jersey Department of Education's Summative Ratings ranked our Woodbridge Academy Magnet School #1 in New Jersey.

Recently we joined Middlesex County and Middlesex College to announce the breakthrough on Phase 1 of the Community, Innovation, and Opportunity Strategic Investment Plan. Part of this initiative includes construction of a new Middlesex County Magnet School on the Middlesex College campus. This will be our second Magnet School at Middlesex College, and we look forward to developing programs in Sustainable Energy Technology; Sustainable Construction and Environmental Technology: Global Logistics, Robotics and Drone Technology: Information, Communications, and Cybersecurity Technology; and Biotechnology and Plant Science.

Our facilities staff worked diligently in all five Magnet Schools, including the completely renovated and fully functional Performing Arts Center at East Brunswick Magnet School. The first performance held was the Senior Arts Gala, featuring art exhibits and productions by students in the School of the Arts. This showcase performance was the culmination of a four-yearlong, \$4.6 million renovation project. A job well done by all!



Yearly, we commend and congratulate ten recipients of the District Teacher of the Year and Educational Professional of the Year Awards. They have created a lasting and positive impact that surpasses their classroom or office. It is their commitment to the profession of education that lays the foundation for the future of our students, thank you for all that you do.

Middlesex County Magnet Schools External Affairs Department won first-place awards in two categories in the New Jersey School Public Relations Association Communication Awards. We were the only school district to receive two first-place honors.

More than 400 students at all five Magnet Schools participated as we celebrated National Career and Technical Education Month with our annual Tech Expo. Winners went on to present their projects to guests attending the Spring 2024 Advisory Dinner. That same evening, the Career and Technical Education Department honored Christopher Gioffre, service director of the Ray Catena Auto Group, as Business Partner of the Year.

We have extraordinary students throughout our district who continue to receive national – and even international – honors. Woodbridge Academy Magnet School students Anika Bukkapatnam, Sara Manjaly and Rachana Senthil wrote a preliminary machine-learning model to expedite the diagnosis of sepsis, potentially facilitating earlier and more successful treatment. Their paper was accepted for presentation at the 13th International Conference on Current and Future Trends of Information and Communication Technologies in Healthcare in Kazakhstan and was

published online by the Dutch company Elsevier Science in the openaccess Procedia Computer Science series.

The Athletic Department has been making headlines. A senior member of the tennis team at Edison Academy Magnet School won the first Greater Middlesex Conference individual championship in the history of the Middlesex County Magnet Schools, and the Edison Academy Boys Tennis team won the Group 1 State Championship, achieving the first group state championship in district history. The Piscataway Magnet School baseball field was named Sports Field of the Year by the Sport Turf Managers Association of New Jersey. The award was presented to Michael Morvay, head grounds foreman of the Middlesex County Magnet Schools Building and Grounds Department in November.

The Adult Education Department has trained and graduated nurses, cosmetologists, electricians and plumbers, contributing to the county's workforce and the well-being of the people. Middlesex County Magnet Schools in the Top of National Rankings of U.S. News World Report of Best High Schools



The U.S. News World Report of Best High Schools released their rankings of nearly 25,000 public high schools throughout the nation. In New Jersey, 426 high schools were ranked based on state assessment proficiency, AP performance, and graduation rates. Edison Academy Magnet School was ranked #2 in New Jersey and #42 in the nation, and ranked the #6 STEM high school nationally. Woodbridge Academy Magnet School moved into the #3 spot from #4 the previous year (#58 nationally). East Brunswick Magnet School increased their state ranking moving up to #202 from #330 the previous year, and ranked amongst the top 25% nationally. Perth Amboy Magnet School increased their ranking to #243 from #288 the previous year. While Piscataway Magnet School's ranking remained the same at #349, they boasted a significant increase in Math proficiency.

New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) Summative Ratings

The NJDOE released the summative ratings for every high school in New Jersey. The summative ratings are based on graduation rates, state assessment proficiency, and chronic absenteeism. We are proud to announce all of our schools ranked among the top 6 high schools in Middlesex County, and ranked in the top 18% of the state rankings. Woodbridge Academy Magnet School topped the rankings at #1 in New Jersey! Congratulations to all!

In an email to parents and guardians, Superintendent of Schools Jorge E. Diaz explained the decision to purchase eclipse glasses for students and staff.

"We are excited to inform you about an upcoming event that presents a unique educational opportunity for our students: the solar eclipse occurring on April 8th," the superintendent wrote. "To ensure the safety of our students while maximizing the learning experience, we are pleased to announce that the school district has purchased solar eclipse glasses for all students and staff.

"This initiative aims to incorporate educationally appropriate lessons surrounding the solar eclipse into our curriculum. By providing each student with solar eclipse glasses, we can safely observe this natural phenomenon while engaging in meaningful discussions and activities that enhance their understanding of astronomy, science, and the wonders of the universe.

"Safety is our top priority, and we want to assure you that the solar eclipse glasses provided to our students meet the necessary safety standards recommended by experts. These glasses will allow students to view the solar eclipse without risking any harm to their eyesight."

All of the students were permitted to go outside at about 3:10 to watch the eclipse – when the clouds allowed. At Edison Academy Magnet School, students went out at 2:45 for a demonstration with props of just what occurs as the moon obscures the sun in an eclipse.

There was general agreement that it was a unique experience, exciting and educational.

The event showcased the completed designs of the Multipurpose Venue, the Student Center, and the new Middlesex County Magnet School, marking a pivotal point where progress becomes tangible, and construction is poised to begin. Attendees dove into the new designs t

Sharing the significance of this milestone, speakers included Board of County Commissioners Director Ronald G. Rios; Middlesex County Administrator John Pulomena; Middlesex College President Mark McCormick; and Middlesex County Magnet Schools Superintendent Jorge Diaz.

"We've been touting this plan since November 2022 and we are beginning to see our vision take shape. The CIO Plan isn't merely an aspiration or a 'hope' of ours, it's a reality," said Middlesex County Commissioner Director Ronald G. Rios. "For all of us who call Middlesex County home, the CIO strategy will be a game-changer in our economy and the quality of our lives – this includes improving the lives of students, faculty, and staff that work and attend this College."

"These amazing additions to our campus will provide new and enhanced opportunities for our students to learn, study together, and engage in a wide range of extracurricular activities including athletics and student clubs," said Middlesex College President Mark McCormick. "Working closely with Middlesex County and the contractors, College administration will seek to minimize disruption to day-to-day campus operations and is committed to regular communication with the College community regarding the construction phase."

"Students from every municipality in the County are eligible to attend our Magnet Schools. Building this new Magnet School means we will be able to serve even more students," said Middlesex County Superintendent of Schools Jorge Diaz. "Its location here on campus will make it convenient for our students to participate in dual enrollment programs. It will also help us to continue building our relationship with the College and the County."

"We are thrilled to add Dr. Howe to the Magnet Schools administration," Superintendent of Schools Jorge E. Diaz said. "He brings with him excellent qualifications and, being a graduate, has keen insight into what we do at the Magnet Schools."

The current Magnet Schools business administrator, Karl Knehr, is transitioning into a new role as the business administrator of facilities and capital planning, where he will oversee the vast capital improvement projects throughout the five campuses.

Howe has a doctorate in educational leadership, management and policy from Seton Hall University, a master's in finance from Rider University and a bachelor's degree in political science from Kean University and is a certified public accountant.

He began his college education while a student at East Brunswick Magnet School majoring in computer assisted drafting, graduating with 15 credits from Middlesex College. He also began his career in public service while still in high school, working for Old Bridge Township through the cooperative education program and volunteering as an EMT with the rescue squad.

"I think there's something for everyone at the Magnet Schools," Howe said.

He said he wasn't sure of his career path when he started high school but found he had an aptitude for computers.

"There's been a big push in the last few years for career and technical education," he said, "but that was something the Magnet Schools have always done – we were way ahead of our time."

Howe lives in Helmetta with his wife, Rebecca, and 4-year-old son, Henry.

Thank you to Interact Club adviser Ms. Simmons and to all the parents, students and staff who contributed during the fall and spring food drives.









Police chief started public service career at Magnet School

Middlesex County Magnet Schools alum and Perth Amboy Chief of Police Lawrence Cattano began his public service career while still in high school.

"I got involved at a very young age," he said. "I started riding in an ambulance at 14." A 1986 graduate of what was then Perth Amboy Tech, Cattano's path to becoming chief in his hometown started when he was an electronics career major in a school quite different from today's Perth Amboy Magnet School. For one thing, there were only about five girls enrolled. Starting as a volunteer for the rescue squad, he became an emergency medical technician at 16 and then was a volunteer firefighter. His electrical training in high school led him to an interest in emergency radio wiring, eventually leading him to follow in his father's footsteps into the police department.

"I just love what I do," he said. "I wouldn't change anything."

He has been a paid police officer since 1991 after starting as a volunteer auxiliary officer in 1987. He became chief in 2022 after a year as acting chief. He now supervises a force of 145 officers, the largest number in the 305-year history of the department. Civilian staff bring the total under his supervision to 280 employees.



Other hats he has worn during his tenure include fire chief and director of emergency management, a position he still holds. He said among the skills he learned in high school electronics classes that have served him well in his career were problem-solving and trouble-shooting.

"Police work is just another kind of problemsolving," he said.

A trained EMT, he was often called in when there were accidents or illnesses involving his fellow students.

"I would be pulled out of class for emergencies," he said.

After graduation he received additional training at Middlesex College, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey and Thomas Edison College.

He said he thinks career and technical education in high school are important whether you eventually pursue the career path you studied, since it gives you skills you can use to earn money while pursuing further studies.

She was part of a team that won an MIT invention competition by designing an agricultural drone.

She now works as a civilian on the Navy's Electromagnetic Aircraft Launch System and says she is "really happy" in her job.



"This was one of the best decisions I made in my life," Quevada said. "I want to be doing something that matters, impacting people in a positive way.

"I do really care about the country and the people who protect the country. People's lives depend on what I do."

Quevada's parents were immigrants from the Philippines and she grew up in Iselin.

She recently returned to Edison Academy Magnet School to talk to students during Engineering Week.

"It was really emotional for me to return to the place where I first began to fall in love with STEM," she said.

She said she was pleased with the changes she saw since her graduation and was happy to visit with Principal Amro Mosaad, who had been "amazing" as one of her teachers.
